
Wisconsin DOC's Overdose Fatality Review Team



- State of Wisconsin
 - 72 counties
 - Urban and Rural Communities
- Cross-divisional and cross-agency membership
 - Division of Adult Institutions
 - Division of Community Corrections
 - Division of Juvenile Corrections
- Established in March 2021
- Over 40 overdose deaths reviewed

Wisconsin Department of Corrections





- Division of Adult Institutions (DAI)
 - 18 Male Facilities
 - 14 Male Centers
 - 1 Female Facility
 - 2 Female Centers
- Division of Community Corrections (DCC)
 - 8 Regions
 - 72 Counties

About Wisconsin Corrections



- The Department of Corrections is charged with supervising more than 65,000 clients placed by the courts on probation, parole, or extended supervision in the community and roughly 20,000 persons in our care incarcerated in a Wisconsin State Prison facility
- DCC is allocated approximately 1,920 probation and parole agent and support staff positions throughout the state
- DAI is allocated over 7,000 positions, with over half of those positions being uniformed staff




The Creation of the OFRT

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Additional Initiatives Resulting From OFR Recommendations



Expansion of MAT



- Additional state budget funds allowed for DOC expansion of related MAT services across DCC
- Our program is now a statewide resource available to all clients experiencing opioid use challenges, releasing from one of the 15 DAI sites, and/or supervised by our DCC agents
- Medications now include naltrexone, methadone, and buprenorphine



Creation of DOC Opioid Advisory Team



- Developed as a recommendation from the DOC Overdose Fatality Review Team
- Purpose is to provide support and assistance to staff as well as resource options
 to persons in our care and on supervision with difficult opioid-related cases
- A team of cross-divisional, cross-agency, and community staff meet weekly to discuss cases and provide recommendations and guidance
- Recently added the review of reported nonfatal overdoses from the prior week

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Harm Reduction Training/Education



- Harm reduction workgroup was formed
- Purpose is to increase awareness and understanding of harm reduction
- A harm reduction training was developed, recorded, and placed in our online learning center for staff
- Harm reduction trainings have been presented to DCC leadership and to several DCC units across the state

Narcan (Naloxone) Distribution



- Narcan is a harm reduction tool used for opioid use
- DOC completed pilot programs for the use of Narcan in Regions 4 & 7
 - Narcan nasal spray distributed to offices for use
 - Training given to all staff for future use
- Recently expanded statewide
- Clients and support individuals can receive Narcan
- Naloxone distribution in DAI

Nalox-Zone Boxes

- Harm reduction strategy used to reduce overdose events and save lives
- Boxes resemble external defibrillators found in public buildings
- They contain two doses of Narcan, a community resource card, a rescue breathing apparatus for CPR, and instructions for how to reverse a suspected opioid overdose
- Boxes are connected to the DOC office Wi-Fi for immediate communication with the vendor when they are accessed





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Fentanyl Education to Staff and Clients



- Significant increase in fatal overdoses involving fentanyl
- Harm reduction workgroup created an educational video for staff
 - Information includes education on fentanyl test strips
- Educate clients and persons in our care on the dangers of fentanyl



Fentanyl Test Strip Distribution Pilot



- Fentanyl test strips (FTS) are a harm reduction tool to keep people safe
- DCC is piloting the distribution of FTS to offices around the state
 - Two offices in each region are participating, for a total of 16 offices
- Clients are given a kit that includes:
 - 4 test strips
 - 4 vials of sterile water
 - Set of instructions
