

Overdose Fatality Review Start-up Resources



Overdose fatality reviews (OFRRs) are confidential death reviews conducted by local multidisciplinary teams to improve overdose prevention and intervention strategies.

OFRRs are becoming a cornerstone of successful community responses to substance use. By combining collaboration between public safety and public health providers with effective use of data to identify system gaps, OFRRs build trust among local stakeholders so they can fully comprehend the substance use challenge facing them and, by working together to implement evidence-based recommendations, prevent future deaths.

Jurisdictions interested in establishing their own OFRRs should consider the resources listed below as a road map that will enable them to understand the methodology, commitment,

and investments required to assemble an effective OFRR, as well as the practical steps they can take to start their own teams. The resources were compiled through a partnership between the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Program (COSSUP) (transitioning from the Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Program [COSSAP]), a U.S. Department of Justice program supported by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA). OFRR Toolkit	An online package of tools, expert guidance, and training designed to provide prospective OFRR teams self-guided direction through the steps necessary to build a successful team on a foundation of coalition building, data collection, and a commitment to overdose prevention. Site visitors are equipped with a practitioner's guide to OFRR implementation; an array of supplemental resources, including sample meeting agendas, work plans, and data collection templates; and a user-friendly online form to request OFRR training and technical assistance (TTA). PHAST Toolkit	Developed by the CDC as a companion to the OFRR Toolkit, the Public Health and Safety Team (PHAST) Toolkit is designed to reduce opioid overdose deaths by using aggregate data and increasing collaboration among all sectors, with a particular focus on public health and public safety agencies. PHAST engages partners through the "SOS" process, which stands for shared understanding, optimized capacity, and shared accountability.	https://www.phast.org

OFR Data System	COSSUP and the CDC developed the OFR Data System to enable communities to capture key information from OFRs and monitor recommendations to develop a framework of accountability. OFR Mentor Program	The BJA OFR Mentor Program encourages the uptake of promising peer practices by new OFR sites by building bridges between nascent OFR teams and established ones that have demonstrated success.
